Prerequisites

Course Description

Course Catalog Description:

Spanish 1411 is the first in the lower and intermediate level Spanish language classes offered by UTPB and is designed to acquaint the student with the four basic skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. It will also include an introduction to Hispanic culture.

In **SPAN 1411** students will acquire novice low to mid proficiency in Spanish (ACTFL guidelines) in all four skill areas: listening, speaking, reading, and writing.

Listening: Students will be able to understand some short, learned utterances, particularly where context strongly supports understanding and speech is clearly audible. Comprehends some words and phrases from simple questions, statements, high-frequency commands and

courtesy formulae about topics that refer to basic personal information or the immediate physical setting.

Speaking: Oral production continues to consist of isolated words and learned phrases within very predictable areas of need, although quantity is increased. Vocabulary is sufficient only for handling simple, elementary needs and expressing basic courtesies. Some Novice-Mid speakers will be understood only with great difficulty.

Reading: Students will be able to recognize the symbols of an alphabetic and/or syllabic writing system and/or a limited number of characters in a system that uses characters. The reader can identify an increasing number of highly contextualized words and/or phrases including cognates and borrowed words, where appropriate.

Writing: Able to write simple, fixed expressions and limited memorized material and some recombination thereof.

A VERY IMPORTANT NOTE: The course requires continuous and independent work to consolidate the knowledge and linguistic skills developed during the semester. Because of the nature of this course, learning is built up on previous material. To be successful, you must have determination, good study habits, and be able to meet deadlines. Remember you are responsible for your own learning!

The beginning student of Spanish, to build a strong foundation in the basics of the target language and to be able to expand toward good conversational, reading, and writing abilities, should mater the following:

- the Spanish alphabet
- basic phonetic system and syntax (word order)
- the subject pronouns, and definite/indefinite articles
- approximately 650 vocabulary words
- the meaning and conjugation of the most common of the -AR, -ER and -IR verbs
- the meaning and conjugation of some common irregular verbs
- the formation of questions
- the concept of masculine and feminine gender
- the placement and agreement of adjectives
- possessives adjectives and pronouns

Measurable Learning Objectives and Outcomes:

This Spanish course pays equal attention to developing all four language skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing), with a special emphasis on the oral aspects of the Spanish language. After studying all materials and resources presented in the course, the student will be able to:

CO.1 Engage in conversations using level-appropriate grammatical structures including narrating events that take place in the present and produce questions and responses on

a variety of topics dealing with everyday life in discussion forums.

CO.2 In terms of level-appropriate spoken Spanish, develop speaking and pronunciation skills through voice recordings and one oral exam.

CO.3 Write simple sentences and organize them into short paragraphs in compositions assignments. Rewrite and revise those compositions for grammar accuracy.

CO.4 Interpret level-appropriate texts in Spanish by answering questions in complete sentences, and/or expressing reactions and opinions in reading assignments.

CO.5 Identify and discuss traditions, customs, and values of the Hispanic world through discussion forums.

CO.6 Apply grammar skills covered in this course to the completion of evaluation sheets, one midterm exam and one final exam.

Course Overview

1. Midterm and Final Exams (1 MT) X (10%) + (1F) X (10%) = (20%)

The midterm and the final exams consist of all the material studied up to that point. They will include different type of activities related to:

- 1. a) Listening and reading comprehension
- 2. b) Short or extended writing
- 3. c) Linguistic contents (functional uses of the language, grammar, and vocabulary)
- 4. d) Cultural and reading material

The final exam will be administered during Final Exam Week. There will be no alternate date for the final exam, so plan accordingly.

2. Compositions (1 Essay) = (15%)

You will write one composition. Complete sheet of instructions will be posted in Canvas at least one week in advance.

Your instructor will return your composition to you in a week for a rewrite (*versión final*). Rewrite is required for the composition and is due before or by the date listed on your Course Calendar. No late work will be accepted. If you fail to turn in a composition or a rewrite, or it is late, your instructor will give you feedback, but you will receive "0" for that assignment.

3. Hispanic Culture Discussion Forums (3 Forums) X (5%) = (15%)

A topic related to Hispanic culture sections will be discussed on Canvas. Some assignments will

be in English, others in Spanish. You will have to post two comments for each discussion.

4. One oral exam (10%)

You will complete this exam by recording a voice message. Specific instructions will be given at least one week in advance.

5. Voice-Recordings and Readings (15%)

You will complete voice-recordings and reading assignments (1 or 2 per module). The recordings will be used to practice your speaking ability and pronunciation. The reading assignments will be used to practice your reading and writing abilities.

6. Evaluation Sheets (Hojas de evaluación) (4 Modules) X (6.25%) = (25%)

Practice is the most important activity of the course. Your interaction with the exercises and activities will have a strong influence on your overall performance. *Hojas de evaluación* include written and listening activities. It is not simply "more of the same" but rather an integral component of the course. Students should note that a direct correlation has been observed between final grade in the course and regular completion of the E-textbook exercises, with students who work regularly generally attaining higher grades in the course. Please remember that exams will be closely related to the textbook exercises, and that you will not be able to be successful in exams unless you do your homework tasks.

Canvas is the platform for the communication tools for use in this class —such essential items as syllabus, announcement, assignments, formats, and other resources. Because all important information is located on Canvas, you must access it daily.

Communication, Grading & Feedback: I will be available by email. Emails will be responded within 48 hours. I will also be available during my virtual office hours for tutoring and advising. Graded assignments will be returned, and feedback will be provided one week after the deadline.

Time Management: There is one or two deadlines per week for course material and discussions, but you should be working at least two hours per day to keep up with the course load.

Policies

 Discussion Board: Discussion Board is primarily for discussing course related topics and issues. Best practices are:

a. Read all message postings in online discussion.

b. Respond to the question directly

c. Reply to minimum of two other student posts.

d. Use a person's name in the body of your message when you reply to their message.

e. Avoid postings that are limited to 'I agree' or 'great idea', etc.

- f. Ensure responses to questions are meaningful, reflective.
- g. Support statements with concepts from course readings, refer to personal experience, examples.
- h. Follow Rules of Behavior.
- 2. Rules of Behavior: Discussion areas are public to every student in this class (including

your instructor) who will see what you write. Please pay attention to the language you use and adhere to the following guidelines:

- a. Do not post anything too personal.
- b. Do not use language that is inappropriate for a classroom setting or prejudicial in regard to gender, race, or ethnicity.
- c. Do not use all caps in the message box unless you are emphasizing (it is considered shouting).
- a. Be courteous and respectful to other people on the list
- b. Do not overuse acronyms like you would use in text messaging. Some of the list participants may not be familiar with acronyms.
- c. Use line breaks and paragraphs in long responses.
- d. Write your full name at the end of the posting.
- e. Be careful with sarcasm and subtle humor; one person's joke is another person's insult.

2. Make-Up/Late Submission Policy:

All course activities must be submitted before or on set due dates and times. If the student is unable to abide by the due dates and times, it is her/his responsibility to contact the instructor immediately and before the due date. No late work will be accepted. There are no extra assignments for extra credits in this course.

3. Academic Dishonesty/Plagiarism/Cheating: The academic community regards academic dishonesty as an extremely serious matter, with serious consequences. - **5. Tracking:** The learning management systems have a tracking feature. Statistics are collected that quantifies how often and when students are active in the course and provides information if the student has accessed different pages of the course.
- 6. Absenteeism: All the course activities have set dates to be completed and submitted. After the due dates the activities will not be available for the students. Not logging into an online course is considered absenteeism. Contact instructor immediately in case of emergency medical situation.
- 7. Course Incomplete/Withdrawal/Grade Appeal:

All students are required to complete the course within the semester they are signed up. Incomplete grades for the course are rarely given, will only be granted if the student provides a valid, documented excuse for not being able to complete the course on time, and has contacted the instructor prior to the scheduled last class to request an extension.
