## **Course Description**

Development of the theory, principles, and techniques of accounting for branches, business combinations and consolidations, and multinational business organizations.

- Account for translation of foreign currency financial statements.

- Account for foreign currency transactions.
- Explain the international financial accounting environment and development of international financial accounting standards.
- Account for interim and segment reporting.

## **Course Overview**

- **EXAMS:** You will have 2 exams. In addition to lectures and problem demonstrations, you are responsible for reading the assigned portions of the chapters. These exams may include multiple choice, problems, and short answer questions. Exams must be taken during the scheduled testing period. There will be no make-up exams, but the final exam score (converted back to 100 points) can count for 1 missed exam <u>or</u> lowest exam score.
- **RESEARCH CASES:** There will be 5 research cases. These cases require that you use the FASB Codification and/or other authoritative literature to respond to the issues in the case. Each case will be worth 25 points and will be graded based on the rubric provided.
- **DISCUSSION ASSIGNMENTS:** There are 5 discussion forum assignments. You will be expected to compose a response to the case and then comment on your classmates' responses.

• **COMPREHENSIVE FINAL EXAM**: The comprehensive final exam will contain questions from material covered throughout the semester.

#### Time Management:

A student should expect to spend three hours on preparation and learning assignments for every semester credit hour. If a class is a 3-semester credit hour class, it is expected that a student should spend about 9 hours out of class on assignments in addition to 3 hours of in-class time for a total of about 12 hours per week to obtain an "A" in a class. ### **Discussion Board**

Discussion Board is primarily for discussing course related topics and issues. Best practices are:

- Read all message postings in online discussion.
- Respond to the question directly
- Reply to minimum of two other student posts.
- Use a person's name in the body of your message when you reply to their message.
- Avoid postings that are limited to 'I agree' or 'great idea', etc.
- Ensure responses to questions are meaningful, reflective.
- Support statements with concepts from course readings, refer to personal experience, examples.
- Follow Rules of Behavior (below).

### **Rules of Behavior**

Discussion areas are public to every student in this class (including your instructor) who will see what you write. Please pay attention to the language you use and adhere to the following guidelines:

- Do not post anything too personal.
- Do not use language that is inappropriate for a classroom setting or prejudicial in regard to gender, race, or ethnicity.
- Do not use all caps in the message box unless you are emphasizing (it is considered shouting).
- Be courteous and respectful to other people on the list
- Do not overuse acronyms like you would use in text messaging. Some of the list participants may not be familiar with acronyms.
- Use line breaks and paragraphs in long responses.
- Write your full name at the end of the posting.
- Be careful with sarcasm and subtle humor; one person's joke is another person's insult.

### Make-Up/Late Submission Policy

### Tracking

The learning management systems have a tracking features. Statistics are collected that quantifies how often and when students are active in the course and provides information if the student has accessed different pages of the course.

### Absenteeism

All the course activities have set dates to be completed and submitted. After the due dates the activities will not be available for the students. Not logging into an online course is considered absenteeism. Contact instructor immediately in case of emergency medical situation.

### Course Incomplete/Withdrawal/Grade Appeal

All students are required to complete the course within the semester they are signed up. Incomplete grades for the course are rarely given, will only be granted if the student provides a valid, documented excuse for not being able to complete the course on time, and has contacted the instructor prior to the scheduled last class to request an extension. - Remain at your desk or workstation for the duration of the test.
- LockDown Browser will prevent you from accessing other websites or applications; you will be unable to exit the test until all questions are completed and submitted.

### **Computer Crash**
