Course Description

Course Catalog Description:

Examination of dynamics, intervention strategies and treatment for a variety of crisis situations with individuals, families and institutions in a community justice perspective. Theoretical aspects of potential intervention and management strategies explored. Domestic violence and mediation techniques and overall structure of dealing with interpersonal violence within third parties is given priority.

Measurable Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Define crisis management and conflict resolution.
- 2. Understand the importance of crisis management and conflict resolution strategies as it relates to the major components of the criminal justice system.

- 3. Discuss historical and current views of crisis management and conflict resolution in policing, courts, and corrections
- 4. Identify mediation, negotiation, restorative justice and other forms of conflict resolution as it relates to both individuals and groups in the criminal justice system.
- 5. Discuss case studies in group discussions in order to create best practice approaches to crisis management and conflict resolution in a criminal justice setting.
- 6. Using a selected model of crisis management and conflict resolution, apply to a case study with a focus on the criminal justice setting.
- 7. Evaluate the political, sociological, psychological, and legal aspects of the approaches to crisis management and conflict resolution.

Course Overview

Readings: Each week the student is going to be required to read portions from the text and journal articles as required within the learning module.

Discussion Topics: Each week the student will be required to participate in a topic based discussion. Each Discussion will be worth 10 points and 20% of the total grade. Original posts will be due by Thursday of each week. Each Student is required to reply to at least two fellow

students by Sunday of each week. Students are also required to respond to any person that replies to their original post. Replies and responses are expected to be comprehensive and thought out and references included in all postings to support the work. "I agree this is a good post" will not be considered as a good reply. See the attached rubric for grading expectation.

Weekly Assignments: Students will be required to write a two to three page essay addressing the topic from the weekly reading. All writing assignments will be required to be written in APA format 7th edition. Each essay will be worth 16 points and 40% of the total grade. See the attached rubric for grading expectations.

Final Project: Each student will be required to complete a 10 to 12 page paper in APA format. The final project will address an approved subject covering contemporary crisis and trauma issues within the Criminal Justice Field. See attached rubric for grading expectations.

Communication, Grading & Feedback:

Students should expect all discussions to be graded by the instructor by Friday of the following week. Written essay grades posted within 7 days from the due date. Final grades are posted as quickly as possible within 7 days of the end of the course term. Faculty will respond to all email communications within 48 hours of the sending of any email. Students are able to make phone or Skype appointments for more individualized attention.

Time Management:

A student should expect to spend eight to twelve hours per week to obtain an "A" in a class. It is important to develop a Time Management Plan to be successful. It is recommended that students complete all reading assignments on Monday and Tuesday; prepare discussion posts on Wednesday for posting prior to the Thursday due date. Although written assignments are due on Sunday, it is recommended to have assignments turned in by Saturday evening. Sundays should be reserved for continuing the replies and responses to the discussion boards.

Policies

Discussion Board

Discussion Board is primarily for discussing course related topics and issues. Best practices are:

- Read all message postings in online discussion.
- Respond to the question directly
- Reply to minimum of two other student posts.
- Use a person's name in the body of your message when you reply to their message.

- Avoid postings that are limited to 'I agree' or 'great idea', etc.
- Ensure responses to questions are meaningful, reflective.
- Support statements with concepts from course readings, refer to personal experience, examples.
- Always include references to support your work.
- Follow **Rules of Behavior (below).**

Rules of Behavior

Discussion areas are public to every student in this class (including your instructor) who will see what you write. Please pay attention to the language you use and adhere to the following guidelines:

- Do not post anything too personal.
- Do not use language that is inappropriate for a classroom setting or prejudicial in regard to gender, race, or ethnicity.
- Do not use all caps in the message box unless you are emphasizing (it is considered shouting).
- Be courteous and respectful to other people on the list
- Do not overuse acronyms like you would use in text messaging. Some of the list participants may not be familiar with acronyms.
- Use line breaks and paragraphs in long responses.
- Write your full name at the end of the posting.
- Be careful with sarcasm and subtle humor; one person's joke is another person's insult.

Make-Up/Late Submission Policy

This is an online course. All course materials will be open and available during the first few days of the course and will remain open. If you know you are going to miss a deadline attempt to complete it before your known absences. If you miss a deadline, a 3% grade reduction per day will be applied.

Academic Dishonesty/Plagiarism/Cheating

Tracking

The learning management systems have tracking features. Statistics are collected that quantifies how often and when students are active in the course and provides information if the student has accessed different pages of the course.

Absenteeism

All the course activities have set dates to be completed and submitted. After the due dates the activities will not be available for the students. Not logging into an online course is considered absenteeism. Contact instructor immediately in case of emergency medical situation.

Course Incomplete/Withdrawal/Grade Appeal

All students are required to complete the course within the semester they are signed up. Incomplete grades for the course are rarely given, will only be granted if the student provides a valid, documented excuse for not being able to complete the course on time, and has contacted the instructor prior to the scheduled last class to request an extension. The student signs a contract that includes the incomplete course activities and the new due dates.
