The study of the jazz idiom from its roots in ragtime and blues through swing bop cool fusion and free styles to current trends in mainstream jazz.



Online Student Authentication

Course Policies

Discussion Board: Discussion Board is primarily for discussing course related topics and issues.

Best practices are:

- 1. Read all message postings in online discussion.
- 2. Respond to the question directly
- 3. Reply to minimum of two other student posts.
- 4. Use a person's name in the body of your message when you reply to their message.
- 5. Avoid postings that are limited to 'I agree' or 'great idea', etc.
- 6. Ensure responses to questions are meaningful, reflective.
- 7. Support statements with concepts from course readings, refer to personal experience, examples.
- 8. Follow Rules of Behavior.

Rules of Behavior: Discussion areas are public to every student in this class (including your instructor) who will see what you write. Please pay attention to the language you

use and adhere to the following guidelines:

- 1. Do not post anything too personal.
- 2. Do not use language that is inappropriate for a classroom setting or prejudicial in regard to gender, race, or ethnicity.
- 3. Do not use all caps in the message box unless you are emphasizing (it is considered shouting).
- 4. Be courteous and respectful to other people on the list
- 5. Do not overuse acronyms like you would use in text messaging. Some of the list participants may not be familiar with acronyms.
- 6. Use line breaks and paragraphs in long responses.
- 7. Write your full name at the end of the posting.
- 8. Be careful with sarcasm and subtle humor; one person's joke is another person's insult.

Make-Up/Late Submission Policy:

All work is due the date set below or as announced by Dr. Keast. Late work is deducted 5% per day the assignment is late. "Late" is defined as beginning an hour after the time/day the assignment was due. Any work or exam scheduled for that period of absence should be completed before the absence.

Purpose: Why teach Jazz History?

- Jazz is America's musical gift to the world
- Jazz is internationally recognized as an art form
- Jazz is world music: cultures from west Africa, Europe, the Caribbean, and Latin America came together in New Orleans to create jazz

- Jazz has influenced art music, rhythm and blues, soul, pop, country, and rock-n-roll
- Many of the important jazz figures have become international cultural icons: Louis Armstrong, Ella Fitzgerald, Duke Ellington, Dizzy Gillespie, Charlie Parker, and Miles Davis to name a few

Method of instruction:

The material in this course is presented using readings from the textbook, coupled with reinforcement in short lectures. Then paired with a group activity and finally an individual assignment and listening quiz.

Readings:

Please complete the assigned reading prior to viewing lecture, participating in group activities, attempting individual assignments, or starting listening quizzes.

Listening Quizzes:

There are 5 (five) listening quizzes in this course. They are multiple choice and reference listening selections, so please have your speakers on and Real Player installed on the computer before attempting to start each quiz.

Assignments:

Assignments are individual and are posted for your peers to view in the appropriate discussion forum.

Persuasive (argumentative) Paper:

A course in music can be very boring unless you, the student, has input into what you study. This is that opportunity! Think of a topic that we might have touched on a bit, not enough, a lot, whatever, and research it further. To clear your topic, send an email to Dr. Keast via Canvas and clear the topic with him **BEFORE YOU START!** After you've gathered your knowledge, compose a 10+ page paper on the topic. It is 10% of your final grade, so please take it seriously. I am anxious to see your inspired research!

Discussion Topics:

Consistently posting in the discussion board is expected and is graded on quality, not quantity of words in your postings. "I agree with you Jim" is not quality.

Final Exam:

None!

CD Review:

Select your favorite band or musical artist which you have access to a few of their CD's or cassettes. Review one of their albums discussing the singer's/group's instrumentation, the variety of musical sounds on the CD you are reviewing, the creativity or freshness of the sound for the singer/group. Once you select a group/singer to study, listen to a variety of their work (2-5 albums). Decide which album you want to review for the project.

- 1. Discuss the album as a whole is it fresh or divergent of past albums by the singer/group? Support your answer with comparisons.
- 2. Pick at least two tunes to discuss further and analyze them for the "trademark" sounds of the performer.
- 3. Listen to lyrics and see if they are consistent with other pieces.
- 4. Why are you drawn to listening to this group? Sell the group as if you are a used car salesman.
- 5. Compare the group/singer's sound to another, similar group/singer. Suggest your second favorite release by the selected group/singer.

Concert Review:

Attend a jazz concert in-world of Second Life or in REAL life! Name the band you heard, give the instrumentation, date of performance, location (SLURL) and titles of a few tunes (if known). What style did the band follow? What specific musical techniques did you hear? Write a couple paragraphs describing your reactions to the music. Some topics you might comment on could include the quality (tightness or lack thereof) of the ensemble playing and/or the quality of the soloists and the influence they seem to

suggest. Remember, the sound is important not the visual appearance, unless that or other external factors significantly affected the performance. Write as much as you can.
