Course Description

Course Catalog Description:

This course focuses on conceptual and theoretical foundations and key issues impacting professional nursing practice in the contemporary health care environment. The student is given an opportunity to expand his/her understanding of the history and development of holistic, patient-centered care, and analyze applicable theories from nursing and other disciplines that incorporate legal and ethical principles, cultural, social, and financial concepts, interprofessional collaboration, and information technologies. Ethical issues health care and confidentiality of patient information are examined. This course is web-enhanced.

Measurable Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

1. Assess the basic components of conceptual frameworks, models and theories from nursing and related disciplines that underlie holistic nursing practice within the context of person, health, and environment.
2. Examine the relationship among philosophy, theory, nursing practice, and research.
3. Appraise historical and contemporary health care issues impacting development of professional nursing practice and health policy.
4. Explore key cultural values and ethical and legal issues and associated standards that influence evidence and theory-based nursing practice and safe person-centered care.
5. Evaluate financial, political, regulatory, and legislative issues impacting the emergence of interprofessional collaboration, education, and health care policy.
6. Analyze the emerging role of health information technologies related to the professional nurse's responsibilities for patient safety, ethics, confidentiality, and quality of care.
7. Evaluate quality and applicability of various media resources and data relevant to nursing and health care issues.

Course Overview

Readings:

Complete assigned text and supplemental materials at the beginning of each module prior to completing and participating Learning Activities (discussion boards and assignments). Most of the learning activities will use reflective dialogue and integrative learning approaches to expand, clarify, find meaning, or extend students' understanding of course concepts, topics; investigations into practice issues, reviews of literature; and professional development.

Exams/Quizzes: There are no exams or quizzes for this course. Learning assessment will be done through assignments and contribution to assigned discussion threads.

Assignments:

Comparison of Theories in Nursing and Health Care **25%**

In this assignment the student will explore 2 nursing theories, the history of their development, issues that influenced the theorists. Using critical thinking and creativity, the student will compare and contrast the elements of the theories and their application in professional nursing and health care.

Analysis of a Workplace Issue **25%**

Each student will investigate a workplace issue, describe background leading to the issue in the context of legal and ethical principles or standards associated with the issue. Professional nursing standards, regulations, and applicable case law associated with the issue will be addressed. The role of nursing theory, quality improvement, and information technology in the emergence or resolution of the issue will be described. The professional nurse's duty to the patient relative to the issue and obligations to society will be explored.

"Talking Points" Presentation **20%**

The purpose of this assignment is to assist the student in developing an approach for addressing fellow professionals about an evidence-based workplace issue using "Talking Points." In this assignment the student will summarize the selected issue, identify pertinent data related to the issue, and propose a solution to the selected issue, including the ethical, cultural, financial, and safety impact of the solution.

Evaluation of Health Care Reform or Informatics Podcast or Vodcast **10%**

The purpose of this assignment is three-fold. First, the student will expand their experience of searching the web for topical information – health care reform. Second, the student will appraise the quality of the design of and information provided by the pod/vodcast. Third, the student will share the pod/vodcast and your appraisal with your peers. This process will provide the group with expanded resources and information regarding health care reform, thus contributing to the creation of a learning community. The student will provide feedback to their peers regarding the evaluation of pod/vodcasts as well as their appraisals, thus demonstrating their critical reasoning skills.

Class and Discussion Board Participation **20%**

Each student will participate in online collaborative activities that explore the foundations of professional nursing practice in the contemporary health care arena, including theories relevant to nursing practice, health care issues, and professional accountability. Student dialogue will focus on identifying assessing resources, comparing theories and issues impacting the evolution of professional nursing and the role of health care reform upon patient care systems. Students are expected to contribute to the dialogue using critical thinking, clinical reasoning, and ethical comportment.

Communication, Grading & Feedback:**Teaching Strategies:**

This course is taught by lecture, discussions, and individual activities. Students may work individually or in groups to complete the selected course assignments. Online discussions provide for synthesis and application of evidence-based content with critical reasoning and analysis. Online discussions via the discussion board are held during the semester. Scholarly projects that demonstrate student's ability to write professionally, make public presentations, and represent the university in public settings are included in this course.

Communication Plan:

Students are encouraged to review the course regularly for updates and information related to assignments. We will make use of course discussion boards, email, and texts to communicate with each other throughout the semester. Students and faculty will be respectful of one another in every communication, demonstrating an openness to varied points of view, honoring each other's perspectives, and providing thoughtful ideas and appraisals of material introduced in the course using relevant literature and evidence. Students and faculty will respond to course-related communications within 24 hours (daytime please) between Monday and Friday. Grades for coursework will be posted within 7 days of due dates. Policies

1. **Discussion Board:** Discussion Board is primarily for reflective course-related topics and issues. Best practices are:

- Do not use language that is inappropriate for a classroom setting or prejudicial regarding gender, race, or ethnicity.
- Do not use all caps in the message box unless you are emphasizing (it is considered shouting).
- Be courteous and respectful.
- Do not overuse acronyms like you would use in text messaging.
- Use line breaks and paragraphs in long responses.
- Write your full name at the end of the posting.
- Be careful with sarcasm and subtle humor; one person's joke is another person's insult.

2. **Make-Up/Late Submission Policy:**

There will be no make-up work UNLESS prior arrangements have been made.

If you have an emergency and are unable to complete an assignment on time, you must contact the instructor before the due date. 5 points will be deducted from the assignment for each day the assignment is late unless negotiated with the instructor.

4. **Attendance and Class Participation:** Regular and active participation is an essential, unmistakably important aspect of this online course. Students will log on a minimum of three times every seven days. All students are expected to do the work assigned, notify the instructor when emergencies arise.
5. **Tracking:** The learning management systems have tracking features. Statistics are collected that quantifies how often and when students are active in the course and provide information if the student has accessed different pages of the course.
6. **Absenteeism:** All the course activities have set dates to be completed and submitted. After the due dates, the activities will not be available for the students. Not logging into an online course is considered absenteeism. Contact the instructor immediately in case of an emergency medical situation.
7. **Course Incomplete/Withdrawal/Grade Appeal:**
All students are required to complete the course within the semester they are signed up. Incomplete grades for the course are rarely given, will only be granted if the student provides a valid, documented excuse for not being able to complete the course on time, and has contacted the instructor before the scheduled last class to request an extension.
